AI Is Only As Good As The Person Guiding It

Used well, AI can help a professional work faster. Used alone, it has a habit of sounding confident while missing the point. It does not know what it has not been told, and it will not ask the hard questions a good advisor asks. It cannot warn you about the clause that saved another owner last year, or the local law that makes one line unenforceable. The output is only ever as good as the person prompting it, and knowing what to prompt is most of the job.

Where It Matters Most

Some agreements are worth getting right the first time. Shareholder agreements decide what happens when partners disagree or one wants to leave. Lease agreements can tie you to costs long after you planned to move on. Employment contracts and sale agreements shape what you keep and what you carry. A small cost now to have these drafted or reviewed properly is far cheaper than the fight that follows a weak one.

None of this means you cannot use modern tools. It means you should not rely on them to stand alone in the moments that count. A trained eye knows what to look for, what to remove, and what to add for your circumstances.
